Understanding hATTR amyloidosis

Hereditary ATTR (hATTR) amyloidosis is a progressive disease, which means the symptoms may worsen over time and can lead to disability and a poorer quality of life. Discussing your symptoms and family history with your doctor is important to receiving an accurate diagnosis and deciding what the next steps may be for you and your family.

The **Symptoms Tracker** can help you take note of symptoms you may be experiencing, how they have been affecting your daily life, and whether or not they are worsening.
